Objective: The objective of this course is to introduce you to federal evidence law and

develop your skills in assessing evidentiary issues in various situations. We will examine the nuances of this area of practice, learning the basics at the federal

level, as well as the Florida arena.

Attendance: Class attendance is mandatory. You are allowed the maximum number of
